I felt some areas could use some clarification. Looking over the chore lists, the process of keeping a house clean and organized seems really overwhelming. At first glance, it sounds like all of the zones should be completed within one week. Could you clarify this early on in the first section? Do you mean that, with approximately 12 zones, each zone should be completed about every 3 months? Also, could you emphasize that it really only takes a certain amount of time (half hour?) each day? Readers may skim through it, think it involves too much time, and give up.
