Featured Comment (Editorial Critique):

The majority of the issues related to punctuation, manuscript layout, word flow, and passive vs. active voice. The good news is, those things can all be learned!

One big area that dictates word flow is the sentence structure. The writing becomes choppy when sentences are not varied throughout each paragraph. Instead of starting each sentence with the same word (i.e., "He"), look for ways you can vary the structure – combine sentences or start a sentence with a prepositional phrase (e.g., "Before he had a chance to run, he ____") or a gerund (e.g., "Staring up at the stars, he wondered ____").

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
